Coming to a New School Amid COVID-19:

A Student Perspective

Switching to Kerr Vance Academy during a global pandemic has shown to be an exciting experience. Many things have changed in the past few months because of Coronavirus. For one, new rules have been put into place to keep all the students safe here at KVA. Masks are now required during the school day, and we're not allowed to carry a backpack around. Sanitizing all things we touch that others may have to come in contact with during the day. We also have to maintain a distance of six feet at all times. Everyone has to adjust to these new rules and regulations and implement them into our daily lives.

While taking these safety measures is very important, it can also come at a disadvantage. Being a new student is already a challenge with having to meet new people, adjust to a different curriculum, and drive to a new area. The anonymity makes it difficult to recognize who everyone is, and remembering faces is almost impossible at first. Not seeing someone's entire face makes it a lot harder to remember the different students' names. Usually, when trying to remember who someone is, you go by their face. But when someone's face is almost entirely covered, you have to go off how tall someone is and hair, making it a lot more challenging to know who someone is before speaking. Masks also make it slightly difficult to hear some people talk. So when you have some quiet people, it can be hard to listen to them from six feet away. Book Bags are also no longer allowed in the school building, making it difficult to carry everything around. You have to bring a binder from class to class, along with your laptop and other items. The binder system is actually really nice since everything is in one place. Having a singular binder to carry around all of your things can also be slightly hectic. With all your papers going into one place, it's easy to slide something into the wrong section of your binder.
